

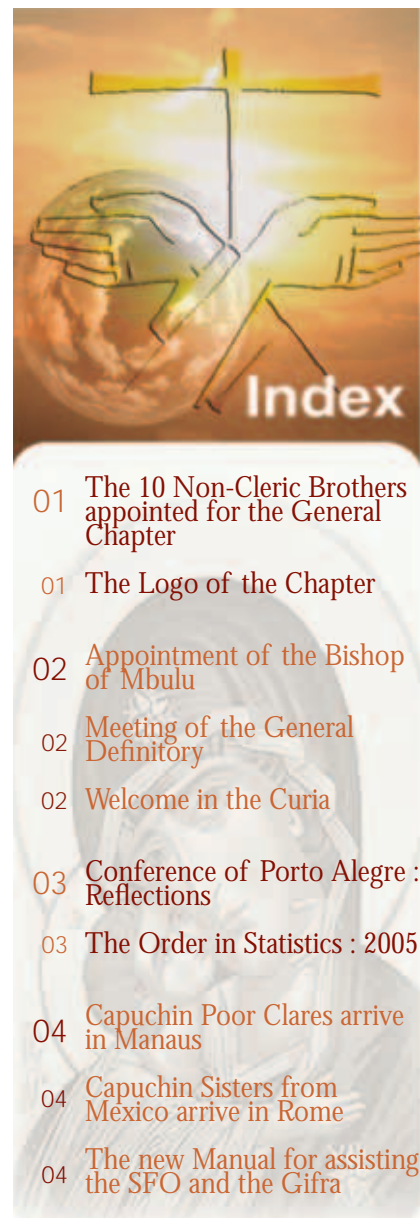
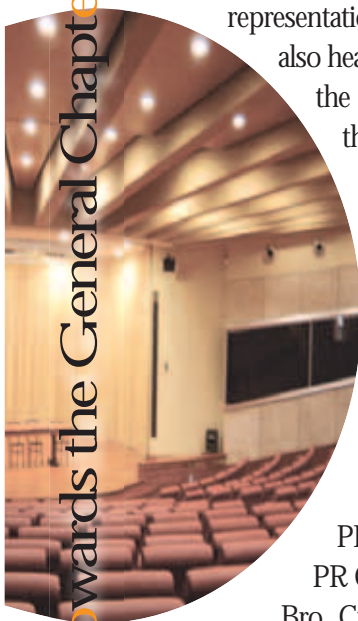


The 10 Non-Cleric Brothers appointed for the General Chapter

According to what had been decided by the 81st General Chapter of 1994 (cfr Constit. 116,4; Ord.GC n. 8/6), after having established the criteria of proportional representation of the non-cleric Brothers in the continents, having also heard the advice of the Conferences and held a straw ballot, the General Minister with the consent of his Definitory, in the Meeting of April 5, 2006, appointed ten non-cleric Brothers for the 83rd General Chapter.

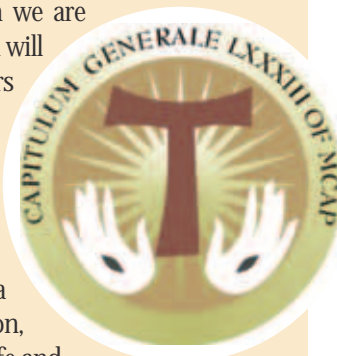

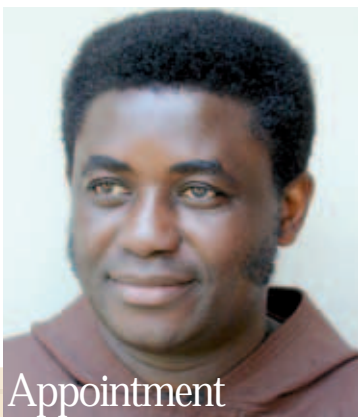

The symbol and the design are placed on a circular form which evokes the emotive and natural aspect; it symbolizes the eternal lineament, the wheel of life, the eternal return, the form without beginning and without end, the idea of time, the past and the present. It is endowed with a symbolic strength of fertility. It is reunion, communion, fulfilment and nobility; it implicitly has the ideas of life and of movement. Appointment of the Bishop of Mbulu

Vatican City : H. H. Pope Benedict XVI appointed Bro Beatus Kinyaiya as the Bishop of Mbulu in Tanzania. Bro Beatus was already Provincial Minister of the province of Tanzania; he was born on may 9, 1957, in Shimbwe, in the Diocese of Moshi. After his primary studies in Shimbwe, he went for his secondary schooling in the Seminary of Maua and Itaga. Then he joined the novitiate of the Capuchins in Kasita and made his perpetual Profession on June 5, 1988. He studied philosophy in Kibosho Major Seminary and theology at St. Charles Lwanga Segerea Senior Seminary. He received his priestly ordination on June 25, 1989. He obtained a B.A. and M.A. in History, Geography and Philosophy from London University. After his ordination, he exercised his ministry as Vice-rector and teacher at Maua Seminary (1989-1992); then for four years he was Rector in the same Seminary up to 1999 when he was elected Provincial Minister of the Province of Tanzania. At the same time, he was President of the Capuchin Conference for East Africa (EACC); he was also President of the Association of Religious Superiors of Tanzania (R.S.A.T.). At present, he was in Rome for a sabbatical year studying Spiritual Theology at the Pontifical Antonianum University ●

Rome - From March 27 to April 7, 2006, the General Definitory celebrated its plenary meetings as programmed:

- The main items were related to the preparations for the coming General Chapter: the provisional programme and the main points of the agenda to be discussed; the appointment by the General Minister and his Definitory of the ten non-cleric Brothers as delegates for the General Chapter and the letter to be written to the Major Superiors and the Presidents of the Conferences in which these names were to be officially announced. The preparation of the General Minister's Report to the Chapter was also discussed.
- The Definitory renewed the International Commission of Economic Solidarity as follows :President - Vicente Kiaziku, General Definitor, Vicepresident - Manoel Delson Pedreira da Cruz, General Definitor; Members : Oliviero Bergamaschi (Ivory Coast), Jesús García Las heras (Ecuador), Francisco Barreto (N.E. Brazil), Francis Gasparik (New York-New England), David Francis Peramangalam (St. Thomas Apostle-Kerala), Hubert Calas (France), Krispin Nociar (Slovakchia), Domingo Añó Cebolla (Valencia), Ennio Tiacci (Umbria), Huub Boelaers (Holland), Othmar Noggler (Bavaria), Linus Fäh (Switzerland); Secretary : Luís Eduardo Rubiano, General Bursar (Colombia); Project Managers: Jean-Marc Boulé (Eastern Canada), Agapit Mroso (Tanzania), Carlos Tavares (Minas Gerais).

Meeting of the GERAL Definitory

- It was also decided to leave to the new General and Definitory to organise and fix dates for the forthcoming formation meeting of the newly-elected or appointed Ministers during 2006.
- It examined and approved the financial budgets of 2005 and the estimates for 2006 of the General Curia and of all the Houses and Institutions depending on the General Minister.
- Examined the numerous triennial reports, the summaries of the reports of the pastoral visits made by the Definitors and the Chapters celebrated and presided over by General Minister and Definitors ●

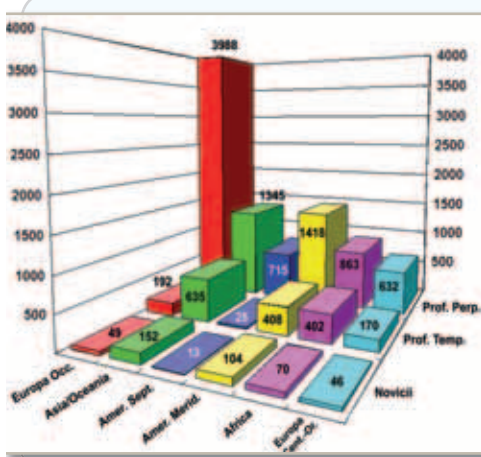

The Order in Statistics : 2005



Rome - Once again this year the Statistics of the Order were elaborated in time and updated up to December 31, 2005; the details will be published in full in the coming issue of ANALECTA. The total number of Brothers in the Order reached 10, 793. The Postulants are 729, the Novices 434, Temporary Professed are 1,832, those Perpetually Professed 8,961, Permanent Deacons 8, Bishops 86, Houses 1,614. Rio

Grande do Sul leads the Provinces with the greatest number of brothers having 377 religious; it is followed by the Province of Karnataka with 366, Venice 363, Lombardy 354, St. Joseph-Kerala 348. The smallest in number are : Province of Austria with 30 and Central Canada with 22. Italy remains the country with the largest number of Brothers, that is 2,561. The greatest number of Novices are found in India (110), Brazil (67) and Italy with 66 ●



Capuchin Poor Clares arrive in Manaus

Manous (Brazil) : Six Capuchin Poor Clares “Sacramentarie” arrived on the outskirts of Manaus : two are from Mexico and four from the Philippines. This decision was taken to commemorate the 25th anniversary of the presence of the “Sacramentarie” Poor Clares in the Asian Archipelago where they had arrived 25 years ago from Mexico. They wanted to enrich the local church by having two sisters from the original monastery. At Manaus there are already ten girls who would like to join them and start the way in their special consecration to God. In the whole of the Amazonas, there is only one monastery of contemplative sisters: the Benedictines of Itacoicara. The Capuchin Poor Clares have two monasteries: one in Flores da Cunha (Rio Grande do Sul) and the other in Macapà, the capital city of the State of Amapà. The “Sacramentarie” Poor Clares are a branch of the Capuchin sisters who are dedicated to perpetual adoration in their churches, day and night ●



Rome – On March 18, 2006, six Capuchin Sisters originating from two monasteries in Mexico arrived at the Garbatella in Rome, to help that community. Before they left for Italy, they underwent

a course to study the Italian language and deepen their knowledge of Italian customs and culture. We all appreciate the generosity shown by the Mexican monasteries in sending these six good Sisters ●
